Supply List

Here is what you will need:

- Wellness canned cat food (Chicken, Beef & Chicken, and Turkey only)
- One Touch Ultra or Ultra Mini Meter
- One Touch Ultra Test Strips
- Relion Ultra Fine II Syringes with 5/16" needle, 3/10cc, 31 gauge, ½ unit markings (or equivalent)
- Sharps container (optional)
- Lancets
- Liv-A-Littles freeze dried chicken treats or Stella and Chewie's Chicken Kisses
- Daily planner or calendar template with enough room for some writing
- Food scale (digital is best)
- Gooseneck desk lamp
- Magnifying glass
- A white sock and ½ cup of plain white rice (NOT instant)
- If a weight loss program is vet recommended a Slater baby scale from Amazon.com

Managing Your Cat's Diabetes

GETTING STARTED

Step 1: A one-hour visit to your home for in-person training.

Before the diabetes tech arrives at your home, you'll need to obtain the items listed on the back of this brochure.

During the visit you'll learn how to set up your testing station, use a glucose meter, test your cat's blood sugar, and measure and inject the insulin.

Choose one spot in your house where you can check your cat's blood sugar every day. Consistency is essential in helping your cat acclimate to this process.

Shaving your cat's ears and injection spots guarantees easier blood testing and injections. We will do this for you so you can confidently home test and inject insulin in the most absorbent area of your cat.

We'll be happy to address any questions or concerns you may have during that time.



THE GLUCOSE CURVE

Step 2: Determining how the particular insulin you're using will work in your cat.

The most difficult part of starting your cat on the road to wellness can also be the most rewarding.

During the first week you will check your cat's blood sugar levels more often than usual to better understand their highs and lows throughout the day and night.

This information is used to tailor the insulin dose for your cat. Daily consultations with our diabetes tech will determine the optimal amount of insulin for your cat.

MAINTENANCE

Step 3: Managing your cat's diabetes.

The hardest part – learning how to test and getting the curve – is over. Now it is time for maintenance.

Remember – Our ultimate goal is to wean your cat off of insulin!

Many people don't know that a cat's pancreas can have as many lives as, well, a cat! This means that it is possible, in many instances, for your cat to "heal" from their diabetes. A lot of this depends on you...if you're ready to commit to the process and follow through, your cat may eventually become insulin free.

HELPFUL HINTS

- If you have an ebay.com account you can find testing strips for about half-price.
- Stay calm when working with your cat. Your cat picks up on your stress and can be affected by it!
- Remember to always warm your cats' ear well before blood testing.
- Make sure your cat has eaten before you give any insulin.
- ALWAYS give your cat a treat right after testing so he or she associates testing with something positive.

Remember - cats are carnivores, not cows

Cats should only eat high protein, low-carb wet food

Give your cats only freeze-dried or cooked *all meat* treats

Cats are not small dogs!

Cats, like people, need regular check-ups
